Immediately he was, as Judd put it, "in the money". He could feel it all round his fist which was stopped by a solid wall of it less than a foot in from the face of the slip-out. For a moment or two he scratched away at the tightly packed mass of coin and managed to dislodge a few pieces which collected on the bottom of the little tunnel under his hand. Then his groping fingers encountered something much bigger than a gold guinea and a different shape. It was more like a knob on the end of something with length, rather than a flat disc. After some more groping that cost him most of the finger nails of his right hand, he got a grip on the thing and pulled it free of the specie among which it lay.

The sheer deadweight of the piece astounded him and he almost dropped it as his hand came clear of the cavity; then he saw it in the light of day. It was a massive gold cross, about nine inches long and so big in section his clutching fingers were a couple of inches short of encircling the stem by which he held it. A ruby as big as a pigeon's egg was set in each of its four corners and emeralds cut like elongated lozenges, filled in the space between them.

For a moment Wick stared at the thing in stunned silence, unbelieving and even a little scared of its magnificence. Then, while he still hung there upside down over the fifty-foot drop, the true meaning of his find got through to him. It was not only final confirmation of the existence of Domingo's hoard, but proof positive that they had discovered its hiding-place.
